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## Course Objectives

The online THO 101 course is designed to give students an introduction to the basic grammatical elements of the O'odham language. Students will study beginning structures of O'odham which will enable them to progress from forming simple statements to expressing more complex thoughts. This course will give you a foundation in the mechanics of O'odham Ñi'okĩ which will set the groundwork for advanced study of the O'odham language. Students will be encouraged to take their online learning and apply it in real world situations. Students will also research O'odham language resources to build up a database of helpful tools in their language learning journey, study issues related to language loss and revitalization, and learn about various aspects of O'odham culture to supplement language learning.

## Learning Outcomes

After completion of the course students will be able to:

- ✦ Identify and reproduce the sounds of the Alvarez-Hale alphabet
- ✦ Begin forming simple sentences in O'odham
- ✦ Ask yes/no questions in O'odham
- ✦ Identify subjects through the use of pronouns
- ✦ Connect simple words and sentences with conjunctions
- ✦ Know the difference between direct and indirect objects in O'odham
- ✦ Form reflexive sentences in O'odham
- ✦ Form reciprocal sentences in O'odham
- ✦ Describe place, location and movement with postpositional phrases and locatives
- ✦ Ask "who", "what" and "where" questions
- ✦ Talk about the present, future and past in O'odham
- ✦ Introduce oneself with an O'odham self-introduction
- ✦ Connect various aspects of language learning with O'odham culture and history

## Course Structure

This is an intensive O'odham language course. Students are assumed to have either no or little previous exposure to the O'odham language and are considered beginners. We will start with the rudimentary basics of the O'odham language and progress to more advanced structures to ready the student for Elementary Tohono O'odham II for which this course is a pre-requisite. THO 101 is a four credit course, which entails a relatively larger work load. It is a good rule of thumb to expect to spend 2 to 3 hours per credit hour each week to dedicate to study and completion of assignments to ensure student success. For a four credit course such as this, this will equal roughly 8-12 hours per week.

## **Language resources**

Over the course of the semester students will research and compile a list of 10 O'odham language learning resources with the intention that these resources will be relied upon outside of class and in the future to continue learning the O'odham language. Materials and sources required or recommended in this course will not count toward the list of 10 resources. More details will be given in Canvas.

## **Language Lab**

Students will keep a Language Lab journal as a way for you to practice what you learn outside of class and to encourage you to find real world applications to supplement our online class time. For at least one hour each week, in addition to the coursework for this class, students will find ways to practice their O'odham language skills. A Language Lab Check-In will be due during Midterm Week to view your progress on your Labs. Completed Labs will be due at the end of the semester. More information will be provided in Canvas. Students will begin recording their Language Lab activities from the first week of class.

## **Term Project**

As part of the students' coursework, students will identify and research a topic related to O'odham language, culture, history or language revitalization. Students must submit a term project proposal which must be approved by the instructor. More information regarding paper guidelines and formatting will be provided through Canvas.

## **Reaction Papers**

Students will assigned four reaction papers during the course of the semester. Each reaction paper will be in response to an aspect of O'odham culture presented in the course.

## **Ñ-'O'ohana**

Students will complete a short story book in O'odham with their newly acquired language skills. The topic of this book and its format will be provided in Canvas.

## **Self-Introduction**

To ensure students have an adequate understanding of the course, students will be required to read through and study the course syllabus culminating in a syllabus quiz which will be completed during the first week.

## **Homework**

Students will complete homework assignments every chapter. These homework assignments will give the student a chance to practice their newly acquired language skills in areas of reading, writing, speaking and listening.

## Student Expectations

- Because this is an online course, students are **required** to have access to a reliable internet connection. Issues related to internet connection will not be accepted as valid reasons for late work or un-submitted assignments. Students are advised to form a “plan B” to make sure assignments are submitted on time should problems with internet access arise.
- Students are **strongly** advised to create a study routine for this course. Since we will not be meeting in person, the student is responsible for accessing, completing and submitting assignments on time.
- Students are responsible for contacting the instructor with any questions or concerns in a timely manner. Please be mindful of appropriate times to contact me. For example, if a student messages me with a time sensitive question just before midnight, chances are I won’t get the message until the next day.
- Due to the intensive nature of this course, it is recommended that the student check Canvas at least 3-4 times a week to remain up to date on assignments, announcements or any other pertinent information.



Each week students will contribute to an online discussion with fellow classmates. This will give the students a chance to interact with classmates and discuss ideas related to the topics being studied in the course. Students must also respond to at least one other discussion post for full credit.

### Syllabus Quiz

Students will be assigned a quiz that will cover the main points presented in this course syllabus text.

### Midterm Exam

Students will complete a midterm exam covering Lessons 1 through 5 and any other pertinent material covered in the first half of the Spring 2018 semester.

### Final Exam.

Students will complete a Final Exam covering all topics learned over the length of the THO 101 Online course. This will be administered during the final week of class. More information will be provided in Canvas in advance.

## Course Policies

### Make Up Policy:

Students will have up to 3 days to turn in assignments after the due date for partial credit. 10% of the assignment grade will be deducted for each day it is late until the cut-off date. After the third late day assignment pages will automatically close the submission option. Students may have the chance to earn extra credit during the course of the semester.
