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### Weather and Power Outage Protocol – July 2018



On July 11, 2018, TOCC's leadership team discussed College procedures for stormy weather, to include flooding, washes running, power outages, phone outages, and Wi-Fi outages. Please refer to this protocol for guidance for those situations. A copy of this FAQ will be posted on the College website. More can be added as we work to find answers to situations that, by their very nature, are unpredictable.

#### Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) and Answers

Who decides whether the College will shut down due to weather or power outages?

Answer: President or designee (the designee is the person appointed by the president during absence of the president)

If the washes are running, can I go home?

Answer: Yes. Please notify your supervisor before leaving if you can.

If I leave work because the washes are running, can I have "admin leave?"

Answer: No, you have to take leave to cover your absence if you want to be paid for that time.

If TOCC closes do I get admin leave?

Answer: Yes. Even if your campus closes and the others are open you will have admin leave if you are at the campus that closes.

#### How do I receive notifications that the College is closing due to emergencies and how do others? Answers:

- \* IT Department will send out text messages (they are working on this to update numbers and you will hear more about it soon)
- \* You will receive an email (if the system is up)
- \* You may receive a phone call (if system is up)
- \* You may receive a face-to-face communication (usually even if the system is up, folks will play an important role by going from room to room to notify students and employees.
- \* A Facebook message will be posted
- \* When possible, TOCC website will note the closure.

#### What about the dorm residents when they have no power?

<u>Answer:</u> Power outages usually don't last beyond several hours. If there is a power outage lasting 18 hours and the estimated time to power-up is more than 8 hours, residents will be transported to temporary domiciles.

#### What if classes are in session and the College is closing? What happens then?

<u>Answer</u>: Classes will be let-go if the College closes. Student Services will use whatever means they have (email/phones) to let students in classes scheduled to occur during the closing know that the College is closed.

What if classes are in session and the College is not closed but students want to go because the washes are running?

Answer: Faculty need to make a judgment-call. Extra work can be assigned to accommodate the disruption. Faculty check with Academic Dean if more questions.

#### Should the College put up signs stating the College is closing?

<u>Answer</u>: Yes, each Department is responsible for immediately posting prominent signs on all entry doors about any announced closings.

#### If the Internet is down, or our computers are not working, who do we notify?

<u>Answer:</u> Notify IT Department. When there are outages or Internet is down or your computer is not working, IT will be working to address problems.

The show is called "Em Ma:cidag Wui," which means "towards your learning," which reflects the purpose of the show—to present topics to listeners that will draw them in to learn new things and consider college life for themselves or their family and community members.

Em Ma:cidag Wui is produced by Kristin Eberhardt with support from the Student Success Center interns who have trained as deejays. Several trained volunteer deejays also contribute to the show.
