## **Course Description:**

This course focuses specifically on accounting and fiscal practices relevant to casino gaming in context of federal, state, and tribal law. Emphasis areas include casino accounting and auditing, internal controls, internal audits, slot machine accounting and auditing, Title 31 (Bank Secrecy Act) compliance, budgeting, cage operations, and money handling and tracking skills.

### **Course Objectives:**

Upon completion of this course, students should have an understanding of:

- 1. The difference between how standard casino and Indian casino revenues are used
- 2. The Tohono O'odham Nation's programs that benefit from casino revenues
- 3. Creating a financial budget
- 4. Desert Diamond Casino commitment to Community Support and Charitable Donations

### **Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):**

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Be able to complete basic accounting tasks in the casino gaming environment
- 2. Be able to demonstrate basic command over the issues of auditing and bank secrecy act as they relate to casino gaming
- 3. Be able to demonstrate the ability to handle and track money in a casino environment
